Mount Carmel Rose Garden Burial Plot

Sadly, we need to inform you the "Rose Garden" plot in the grounds of Mount Carmel Hospital in Braemor Park, Churchtown, Dublin, 14 has now been moved to Kilmashogue Cemetery, Rathfarnham.

The Rose Garden was a very special plot provided by the Little Company of Mary since the early 1960's for parents to bury their babies lost in early pregnancy and was much appreciated by bereaved parents.

However, the Sisters needed to build accommodation for their older Sisters. They have sought and received planning permission to do this. They are in the course of building at the moment. They have told us that they wanted to leave the plot where it was and looked, with their architects, at every possible option in order to make that happen but it just wasn't feasible.

The plot has been moved to Kilmashogue Cemetery in Rathfarnham recently and it is hoped that parents and families who have suffered through miscarriage will have another gentle and special place of contemplation and reflection.

Although the whole project was handled very sensitively, we really feel that the plot should have been allowed to stay where it was. We find it distressing that what parents felt was their baby's final resting place has now been disturbed and relocated. Our Association was extremely upset about this move and could not condone it because of the hurt it may cause to women and their partners whose babies are buried there.

Representatives from the Association were in Kilmashogue Cemetery for the day on Friday 30th July 2004 for the transfer of the plot. The Committee members stood by and watched as fifteen full size coffins containing the remains of the babies who had been buried in the Rose Garden were laid to rest.

The Association was upset that so little time was made available for all parents involved to be notified of this. Our Association did

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inform our own members although we realise that parents affected might not currently be members.

We feel that David Fanagan, as Funeral Director, and the Staff of Mount Carmel Hospital handled the proceedings on the day with great sensitivity and respect.

It was an extremely emotional day carrying the pain and the emotion of parents who could not be there on the day.

Annual Services of Remembrance 2004

This years service was held in St. Theresa's Church, Donore Avenue at 3pm on 7th November. For many who have begun to attend our service every year it has become a special place for them to come and remember their babies and spend time with their thoughts alongside others who have shared similar experiences of loss through miscarriage.

Yvonne's Story

We had been trying for a baby for a year and a half. Then one day in February I did a test and was over the moon when I saw the positive sign. I made an appointment with my doctor, and my husband came with me, when she confirmed that we were going to have a baby. Well what can I say. I have never seen Mark (my husband) cry with delight. I did everything I was supposed to do, no drinking, watch what I eat, I did everything. When my ten week check-up came around, I went to my doctor, she did an ultra sound and said that she couldn't find a heartbeat but said that her machine was old and that I had nothing to worry about. So I went home and did whatever I had to do and got myself ready for work the next morning. I was working on Thursday the 8th April 2004. I was in at 10 a.m. I woke at 8.30 a.m. and found blood on the sheet. I got such a fright. I rang Mark who was in town and then I rang my Mam (who lives next door) and she came over right away and told me to go straight to the doctor. I rang Mark back and told him that I would meet him in town at the doctors. When I went in, she sent me straight to the hospital and told me it was probably nothing as sometimes it happens. When I went to the hospital, it was awful. When I told them that I was bleeding, they did a scan and told me that if I was still bleeding the next week that I was to go back and because I have a rare blood type, I had to get an anti-D shot and would I come back

For those parents, who were there, they watched as their tiny babies were laid to rest for the second time; first time they had been gently laid to rest in the Rose Garden, some many years previously, by Gardener Michael Reed. Their final resting place in Kilmashogue Cemetery is a place now where the parents can go regularly and place a flower and be with their memories.

There was a very moving and thoughtful graveside Service involving parents, religious, Hospital Staff and representatives of the Miscarriage Association of Ireland.

For others who attended for the first time, it offered them comfort in their grief and left them feeling less isolated.

Being able to stay awhile after the service to fill in the Book of Remembrance or just sit awhile with their thoughts and memories meant so much to them.

Everyone's life has become so busy lately that it feels so good to be able to stop the rush for a whilte and spend quiet time in memory of our precious babies.

another day to get it. I said that I was had a journey to make to the hospital, that if they could do it that day that I would go back so they agreed. As I was leaving the hospital (after getting my anti-D shot) I could feel a warm glow coming out of me. When I went back into the hospital, and told the nurse what had happened, she was strange with me, like feeling sorry for me, but not feeling sorry for me. I was in hospital for two days and saw four different doctors who all had a different take on what they were doing. One doctor called my miscarriage a missed abortion, which I couldn't and still can't handle. The doctors kept calling our baby a foetus and to us it was our baby. Our baby was growing inside of me and I knew our baby was real and not just a thing. Every doctor did an internal examination. I had four internal examinations and four ultra sounds. Each doctor said that we were either seven or eight weeks pregnant when we knew that we were just eleven weeks. Then I saw a doctor on Saturday morning, who told me I was ten and a half weeks pregnant. I never had a D and C as they said our baby passed through my body and that I didn't need one. But I went into hospital with some dignity and respect for my body and baby and came out feeling humiliated, scared and a lack of respect for myself after what they have done and I still have no baby at the end of it all. I hope my story will help someone else and that you are not alone.

Service of Remembrance – Portlaoise

A Service of Remembrance for babies lost either during pregnancy or early in their short lives was held in St. Peter & Paul Cathedral. Portlaoise on Sunday 19th September 2004 at 3.00 p.m. It was organised by the Staff of the Maternity Unit in Portlaoise General Hospital. Although there was a very big attendance, there was a lovely intimate and moving feel to the Service. Maggie O'Neill, Mary Lawson and Cathy Lynch represented the Miscarriage Association of Ireland. Those who attended were given snowdrops to plant in memory of their babies. Many of those who attended completed our Book of Remembrance on the day. The Hospital are in the course of organising their own Book of Remembrance and we have no doubt that it will bring great consolation to those who have lost babies in the Portlaoise Hospital.
